- Look in **Library Catalog** for other materials about your occupation. Subject headings might be: "Vocational guidance --United States" or "Business -- Vocational guidance" (or use any broad occupational area such as History, Psychology, Social Sciences, etc.) You can also use keyword searching.
- Look in indexes for periodical articles about your occupation.
